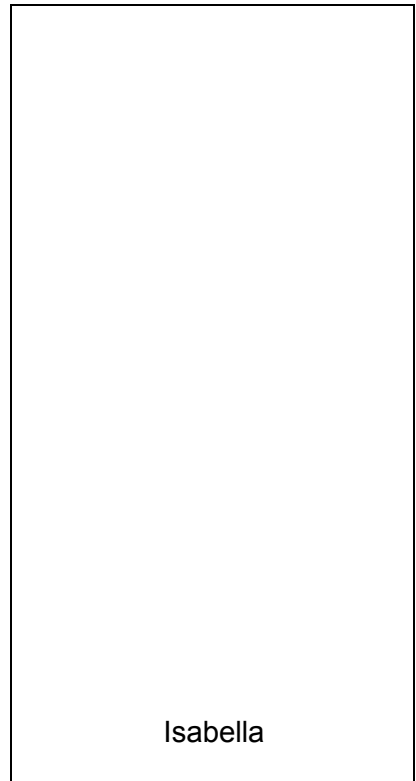
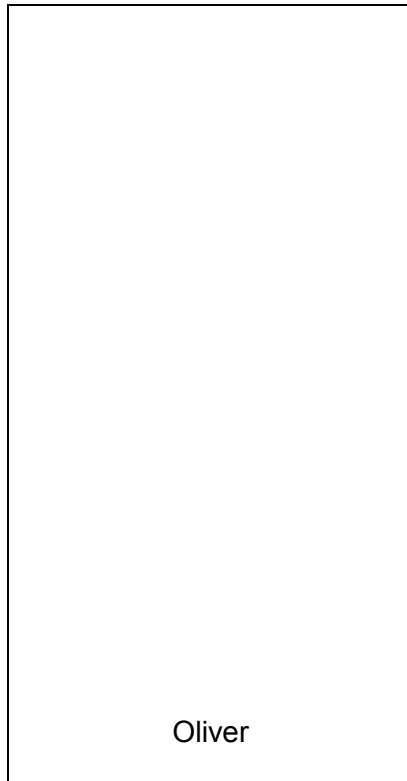


Three Classmates



Read the sentences and draw the three classmates.

1. Oliver, Aiden and Isabella are classmates.
2. Oliver is the tallest.
3. Isabella is shorter than Aiden.
4. Aiden is the fattest.
5. Oliver is thinner than Isabella.
6. Aiden's hair is longer than Oliver's, but it's shorter than Isabella's.
7. Isabella has got the biggest eyes. They are blue.
8. Oliver's eyes are bigger than Aiden's. They both have brown eyes.
9. Aiden's ears are bigger than Isabella's, but they're smaller than Oliver's.
10. Oliver's nose is bigger than Isabella's.
11. Aiden has the smallest nose.
12. Isabella has the nicest smile and Aiden has the longest neck.
13. Oliver is the smartest. He's wearing a blue shirt and black trousers. His shoes are also black.
14. Aiden is wearing a blue T-shirt and green shorts. He has got white trainers on.
15. Isabella is wearing a red dress. She has also got red shoes on.



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Three Classmates

In this enjoyable teaching activity, students draw pictures of three classmates from a comparative and superlative description of their appearance.

Before class, make one copy of the worksheet for each student. You will also need some coloured pencils.

Procedure

Begin the activity by pre-teaching or revising comparative and superlative forms of simple adjectives.

Give each student a copy of the worksheet and some colour pencils.

Tell the students to read the sentences.

The sentences describe three classmates using comparative and superlative forms.

After reading the sentences, the students draw pictures of the three classmates from the description.

When the students have finished, have them compare their pictures in pairs.

As an extension, students can write a description of three of their classmates using comparative and superlative forms and then dictate the description to a partner for them to draw.
